Message from the Workshop Manager - Roger Holgate

Thanks to those members who took an interest in attending the table saw instruction and safety sessions headed up by Clarrie and Len →. Those of you who did not attend have certainly missed lots of good hints and instructions for safely using the saw and it's attachments including feather boards and sled.

The new router table is now up and running and I invite any of you who are interested to have a run through on its operation. I propose showing no more



than two members at a time as it is too difficult for all to physically become familiar with the controls etc. when big numbers are present. I have printed up a reminder list to use when showing the features and operation of the router machine and table and will welcome you on a "first in first served" basis.

"Thumbs up" to those who answered the call and assisted with tidying up for Katrina's recent visit.

I have recently purchased a ½" drive ratchet and breaker bar for the socket sets along with a few missing metric sockets. This will give us a reasonably set for our type of usage and hopefully answers a recent request.

The shed has gratefully acquired some non-slip matting for the big centre bench to be used when sanding flat timber, we all know how difficult it can be to stop the timber from sliding all over the place. **Just one word of warning**, there is a bearded gentleman who will be most upset if this matting gets contaminated with glue, paints or oils. In other words please put it away when you have finished sanding

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Above is an enlarged photo of a 5/64" drill bit which I went to use recently only to find that someone has overheated it, resulting in straightening the fluting out and breaking the end off. It has then been put back into the drill set. When drilling timber, especially hardwood, work the drill in and out of the timber to remove the shavings and this should not happen. The smaller the drill the more important this seems to be.

If you do damage something please do not just put it away, write it up on the blackboard on the tool cupboard and tell someone. If you happen to be doing a personal job and this happens how about slipping up to the hardware shop and getting a replacement. Think of the next person who may come to use the tool and think of who does all the running around trying to keep things up to date.

Upcoming AGM and election of a new Committee

Doesn't time fly? Under our Constitutional obligation, we will hold our next AGM on Saturday 29 April at 2pm.

The AGM is usually a pretty straightforward event with little formal activity other than a couple of reports to accept.

The BIG deal is to elect a new Committee for the next 12 months. All positions are declared vacant and all members are eligible to stand for any position on the Committee. At this point, I am aware of one position (Secretary) that will be not sought again by the existing Secretary (Jack Child). But all positions are vacant on the day and we need to have members commit to help running the place, otherwise it will fail (legally as well as practically).

Some of our current Committee members have been in the management group for all or most of our 9 years of existence. This is not healthy for two reasons:

- 1. it is a bit of an ask to expect the place to be run by the same team forever some of whom are now getting on in years. What happens if they move away from town or die? and
- 2. unless new Committee members take up the challenge, the Shed will most likely drift on into oblivion because new ideas for improving and developing the place will get fewer as the "old" guard achieves its ambitions for the place. Renewal and invigoration is very important in a community organisation like ours.

There are a number of duties that need review and management such as keeping an eye on our Policies and Procedures to make sure they keep pace with the Shed's activity and requirements. Also there is a need for someone to manage social things such as Seminars, development and conduct of social events (visits to other Sheds, invitations to people to come to our Shed etc). Perhaps a new Committee member might take up some of these challenges. If you want a good Shed, this stuff just has to be done.

Things that happened during February:

On this occasion we were able to show her the significant populating of our Metal Workshop with machines that offer a whole new dimension for members to express their skill and talent as well as offering members the opportunity to learn and develop entirely new skills and enjoyment.

Katrina, again, underscored her great admiration of the Shed movement and, in particular, her affection for Yass and our Shed and emphasised the NSW Government's commitment to Men's Sheds all across NSW.

In the photo ←, you will note that Katrina is the rose between two thorns: Deputy Mayor and Shed member, Kim Turner and President, Bob Nash.

Katrina also confided to me that a significant reason for her keenness to visit YVMS again, was the prospect of enjoying more of our famous 3☆ Chef's work in the kitchen. R2 did not disappoint and with the help of Tony (T3) Warren, Peter Roberts and Mike Poulton, this is what you missed (you can get a hint from the photo →) if you were unable to attend on the day - so don't stay away in future if you can possibly avoid it! This is what a 4 course Morning Tea looks like!

We also showed Katrina the disabled access gardens the Shed has installed as a community use asset and which utilise the "wicking garden" principle.

These gardens were partly funded with NSW Grant money and also utilising a generous donation of truck mudguards made by the Wagga Wagga Men's Shed.

New Accreditation System for Shed machines and equipment is now operating

Under new safety and accreditation rules, if you wish to operate any of the following categories of equipment at the Shed, you will need to have one or more of the following Accreditation categories printed on your name tag - after having been accredited by Roger Holgate, Len McGuigan or Clarrie Schlunke, all of whom have been approved by the Committee. Talk to Roger, Len or Clarrie about accreditation if you wish to operate machines (in any of the categories listed below at the Shed). Len has asked me to let you know that he will do accreditations at any time (including out of normal Shed hours) - just contact him as follows: Ph No: 6226 1549. email: lipa2582@bigpond.com

The process is not onerous and there are no exams. All you need to do is attend for a run through on our particular machines, their idiosyncracies and quirks and also how to treat them right to keep them (and you!) operating safely and indefinitely. Once this process is complete, you will be authorised to use those machines and your name tag will ber one or more of the following accreditation codes:

W = Wood Working Machines; and **M** = Metal Shop Machines

- <u>W1 and M1</u> = <u>full access</u> to all machines and equipment
- W2 and M2 = all battery operated or electric hand held tools (saws, sanders, grinders, drills etc)
- W3 and M3 = fixed wood and metal cutting machines, pedestal drills, drop saws, table saws, fixed sanders etc
- <u>W4 and M4</u> = lathes and milling machines
- <u>W5</u> = other major equipment (thicknesser, table router etc)
- <u>M5</u> = welders and future other acquisitions (plasma cutters etc etc)

Roof over Containers Project

We have good progress happening on this YVMS life-changing project.

Rob Barker's engineering business, 5QS Barker Harle, has prepared drawings → showing the proposed installation of a roof over the two containers and covering all of the space between the containers and from the containers back to the west wall of the existing Shed Workshop.

This roof will significantly expand the comfort and versatility of our Shed. We will see benefits in the temperatures in the containers being better controlled. Also, the roof over the open areas will allow us to establish under cover social areas outside as well and expanding and facilitating Workshop and project activity under cover and out of the sun/rain.



Members are invited to examine the drawings and make any comments or suggestions you feel might be helpful. the drawings are on a board which is temporarily placed on the card table in the corner of the Common room.

The next steps will be to lodge a DA with Council and then obtain quotes for the work.

We have been saving funds for this project, but until we get quotes we will not know if we have sufficient funds or if we will need to seek a grant. Stand by for news as the project progresses.

YVMS Shed Matters, March 2017

Plan to open an additional Bank sub-account

The Treasurer (Sam Noor) is organising to open a new sub account known as "Projects" in which any funds in excess of \$2,500 currently in our General Account will be held. Donations that are given to the Shed for specific purposes such as the recent IGA (\$2,270.63) and the YVMS Exercise Group (\$400) donations will be automatically paid into the new Projects Account. The Shed regularly has projects on the drawing board and this will allow more accurate and transparent planning, management and monitoring of the capacity to fund projects and to deliver them.

This new account, when finalised, will have some \$6,800 in it and current projects on our planning board include the installation of a patio door behind the roller door to improve amenity, improve comfort on hot or cold days and reduce wind and rubbish blowing into the Shed; building of a small shed on the back wall of the wood workshop to house the suction air cleaner machine and our paint supplies; and the BIG project, to install a roof over the two containers and reaching back to the west wall of the Shed. One of our members has privately and anonymously donated \$2,000 towards this roofing project.

Thursday 2 March (ie tomorrow) 12.30pm - Planning for a wine bottling event

Some members may have noticed the appearance of a large blue plastic drum in the foyer area of the Shed late last year. For those who are not aware of the contents it contains red wine, not quite to commercial standard, donated by Dog Trap Winery. The original offer was actually up to 600 litres but as much as I love the odd glass of red that was a bit much to handle. Instead I accepted about 200 litres.

My original idea was to have a fun day for all members along with friends and family to promote fun, fellowship, to enable friends and family to see what the Shed is all about and perhaps even make a dollar for the Shed at the same time. A couple of weeks back some of us had a little taste with a mixed result. R\$ \$\dagger 2's Ravishing Recipe of the Month

Now that we've been hit with some hot weather, (well, it was hot when I submitted this recipe!), I think it's a good time to try something a little different. This recipe is quite versatile it can be served hot or cold. It can also be optioned up according to taste and availability of herbs and spices. It is great cold as a soup or alternatively served with lamb as a side or as a sauce with some garlic butter.

A good recipe website is attached at the end.

<u>Chilled pea, mint and lemon soup</u> - (serves 6)

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp olive oil, plus extra to serve
- 3 golden shallots, finely chopped
- 600 ml chicken or vegetable stock
- 600 gm frozen peas
- ½ cup (loosely packed) mint leaves, plus extra to serve
- 2 lemons, juice only
- To serve: crème fraîche

METHOD

Heat oil in a saucepan over medium-high heat, add shallot and cook for 5 minutes or until soft. Add stock, bring just to the boil, remove from heat, add peas and stand for 5 minutes.

Process pea mixture in a food processor with mint until smooth, add lemon juice, season to taste with sea salt and freshly ground black pepper and refrigerate for 3 hours or until chilled. To serve, ladle soup into bowls, top with a dollop of crème fraîche, drizzle with olive oil and scatter with mint.

Options

- Some bacon or ham pieces for a little crunch.
- Some red capsicum, for colour
- Some chilli for spice

Workshop Manager's Expert Advice to Shed users (with thanks to Alf Atkin)

Tools & their uses

HAMMER: Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate expensive parts not far from the object we are trying to hit.

MECHANICS KNIFE: Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on boxes containing seats and motorcycle jackets.

ELECTRIC HAND DRILL: Normally used for spinning steel pop rivets in their holes until you die of old age, but it also works great for drilling mounting holes in fenders just above the brake line that goes to the rear wheel.

PLIERS: Used to round off bolt heads.

HACKSAW: One of a family of cutting tools built on the Ouija board principle; It transforms human energy into a crooked, unpredictable motion, and the more you attempt to influence its course, the more dismal your future becomes.

VISE-GRIPS: Used to round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

OXYACETYLENE TORCH: Used almost entirely for lighting various flammable objects in your garage on fire. Also handy for igniting the grease inside a brake drum you're trying to get the bearing race out of.

DRILL PRESS: A tall, upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, splattering it against that freshly painted part you were drying. WIRE WHEEL: Cleans rust off old bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench at the speed of light. Also removes fingerprint whorls and hard-earned guitar calluses in about the time it takes you to say, "Ouc ...".

HYDRAULIC FLOOR JACK: Used for lowering a motorcycle to the ground after you have installed your new front disk brake setup, trapping the jack handle firmly under the front fender.

EIGHT-FOOT LONG DOUGLAS FIR 2X4: Used for levering a motorcycle upward off a hydraulic jack.

PHONE: Tool for calling your neighbour to see if he has another hydraulic floor jack.

TWEEZERS: A tool for removing wood splinters.

SNAP-ON GASKET SCRAPER: Theoretically useful as a sandwich tool for spreading mayonnaise; used mainly for getting dog-doo off your boot.

E-Z OUT BOLT AND STUD EXTRACTOR: A tool that snaps off in bolt holes and is ten times harder than any known drill bit.

TIMING LIGHT: A Stroboscopic instrument for illuminating grease buildup.

TWO-TON HYDRAULIC ENGINE HOIST: A handy tool for testing the tensile strength of ground straps and brake lines you may have forgotten to disconnect.

CRAFTSMAN 1/2 X 16-INCH SCREWDRIVER: A large motor mount prying tool that inexplicably has an accurately machined screwdriver tip on the end without the handle.

BATTERY ELECTROLYTE TESTER: A handy tool for transferring sulphuric acid from a car battery to the inside of your toolbox after determining that your battery is dead as a doornail, just as you thought.

AVIATION METAL SNIPS: See hacksaw.

TROUBLE LIGHT: The mechanic's own tanning booth. Sometimes called a drop light, it is a good source of vitamin D, "the sunshine vitamin", which is not otherwise found under motorcycles at night. Health benefits aside, its main purpose is to consume 40-watt light bulbs at about the same rate that 105-mm howitzer shells might be used during, say, the first few hours of the Battle of the Bulge. More often dark than light, its name is somewhat misleading.

PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER: Normally used to stab the lids of old-style paper-and-tin oil cans and splash oil on your shirt; can also be used, as the name implies, to round off Phillips screw heads.

AIR COMPRESSOR: A machine that takes energy produced in a coal-burning power plant 200 miles away and transforms it into compressed air that travels by hose to a Chicago Pneumatic impact wrench that grips rusty bolts last tightened 40 years ago by someone in Blackburn, and rounds them off.

Very Serious and most important Scuttlebut item for March - the emergence of Men's Sheds in Australia

On several occasions in recent times, notably on Mark "BOZ" Bosma's famous and viral YassFM Radio Show and more recently at the morning tea with the Hon Katrina Hodgkinson MP early in February, I have been asked to answer the question: "Where and when did the first Men's Shed in Australia appear?"

My usual response (being an intrinsically lazy type) to this question is "Who knows?" There seem to be conflicting views about the first Shed being established in South Australia, New South Wales or Victoria. However, there is little doubt that the Men's Shed idea and phenomenon is an entirely Australian one.

It has become increasingly clear to me that the question "who was first" is one that interests people and perhaps a little research and sleuthing might be worth the effort. Accordingly, I have done that research and have come up with some indications that might take this story a little further.

The challenge for you is to test my findings, do some research yourselves and give me info to update this story for the next Messenger. Here are the stories from each of those States to the best of my ability to find the history:

<u>Grenfell Men's Shed and Lane Cove</u> are regarded as the ones fighting for national honours in NSW. Here are some bits of publicly available materials on these:

"The Grenfell Men's Shed: it all started in 2003 with an idea that Len Wallace had. He summoned the troops at the Exchange Hotel for a public meeting, (The pub where all the best meetings happen)".

Both Lane Cove and Tongala in Victoria get a mention in this Wikipedi entry :

"The first men's shed (by that name) was opened in Tongala, Victoria, Australia on July 26, 1998. [4] Named after its founder, Dick McGowan, the shed predates the Lane Cove Community Shed in New South Wales by just a few months, though both likely originated from ideas discussed at the National Rural Health Conference in 1995. Lane Cove Community Shed was opened in December 1998, and was founded for 'shedless' men, encouraging social activities friendships, while providing vital health information to its members."

Goolwa Men's Shed, South Australia: This is an entry on the City of Playford, South Australia, website.



The newest and oldest Men's Sheds in Australia

Delegates from across Australia, New Zealand and Ireland, headed to Newcastle on 17–20 October for the National Men's Shed Conference. Mike Evans, City of Playford's Men's Wellbeing Worker attended as the City of Playford representative.

Attendees had the opportunity to visit some of the local men's sheds and their communities. Michael visited Raymond Terrace Men's Shed, Salamander Bay Men's Shed and the Fighter World Museum. England now has 117 sheds, Scotland 38, Wales 7, New Zealand 54 and Europe, Canada and the USA 10.

In Australia, the oldest and youngest Men's Sheds are both in South Australia. Playford Men's Shed is the youngest and the Goolwa Men's Shed, the oldest, which was opened by Honourable Dean Brown on 24 February 1993.

"As you can see from the growth of Men's Sheds

There you have it. According to the sources I have found, <u>Goolwa SA is the first</u> (although it may not have used the name "Men's Shed" but seems to have been influential in the idea catching on across Australia), followed by Tongala (Vic), Lane Cove and Grenfell (NSW) in that order.

If you are not totally exhausted by now and would like a little bit of extra info, YVMS opened its doors in April 2008 and had its Official Opening Ceremony on Saturday 6 September in 2008 which was conducted by the then Mayor of Yass, and YVMS Patron, Nic Carmody and attended by the then Federal and State MPs (Alby Schultz MHR - Federal) and Katrina Hodgkinson (MLA - NSW). A formal Ngunnawal smoking ceremony was conducted at the opening.
