At the end of the morning, we had assembled all 4 walls and worked out what comes next. We gave it away around noon when we got to the standing up of the walls stage and it was decided that it was too windy and therefore might be dangerous. We also had to transport the ridge cap assembly to the Shed for drilling and screwing as our on-site equipment was not up to the task.

We got frozen, slightly wet and blown away last time and gave it away after assembling the 4 shed walls, but did not stand them because of the wind.

On Saturday morning, just gone, 8 members showed up again to finish the job. We arrived bright and early at 0930 to clear skies, warm sun, no wind and the expectation that it would all be finished in good time for us to get to the Shed for the BBQ.

What a mistake that turned out to be!

We still needed to assemble the two roof panels, the two doors, stand the walls, attach the roof and generally tidy up and call it a day! Ha!!

The shed itself is a great lesson in the old adage “you get what you pay for”. The engineering of it seems to have been done by one of those monkeys who has taken time off from his computer writing Shakespeare’s plays (which researchers say is possible given sufficient time – ie eons). This design Engineer needs a deal more education and training in my humble view.

The hinges do not attach to the doors snugly and when the internal upper slide bolt is in place, you need to push the roof up to open the door again.

Another adage we follow at the Shed is “if you have a good idea, let me know how you get on”. Whoever had this good idea will do a lot more research next time before accepting a challenge.

Fantastic Foody Facts and Frolics

Because this Messenger has to last you for 3 months, this time there are several recipes for you to try. Many thanks to Joe Morrissey and Len McGuigan for their efforts this time.

If you have a good one, send it to me for the May Messenger.

Pumpkin and red Lentil Soup.

This is the soup I prepared for the Shed AGM. The only modification you might like to make is to alter the amount of chili. Red chilis are unpredictable for how hot they are. Also with chillies you need to make sure you remove all the seeds.



Joe M

1 tablespoon olive oil,	1 long red chilli, seeded and chopped.
1 onion, finely chopped,	500g pumpkin, chopped.
350g orange sweet potato, chopped,	1 litre vegetable stock.
1 tablespoon tahini	½ cup red lentils.

1. Heat the oil in a large saucepan over medium heat, add the chilli and onion and cook for 2-3 minutes, or until the onion is soft. Reduce the heat to low, add the pumpkin and sweet potato and cook, covered, for 8 minutes, stirring occasionally.
2. Increase the heat to high, add the stock and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to low, and simmer, covered, for 10 minutes. Add the lentils and cook, covered, for 7 minutes, or until tender.
3. Transfer the mixture to a food processor or blender, add the tahini and blend until smooth. Return to the saucepan and gently heat until heated through. Garnish with chilli and serve with crusty bread.

Easy Pizza Dough

You can use any topping, I like to keep it simple.

2.5 cups plain flour,
½ tsp salt,
7g dry yeast,
3 tsp olive oil.

Sift flour & salt into a large bowl. Stir in yeast. Make a well in the centre add 1tbsp olive oil, 1 cup lukewarm water.

Mix until a soft dough forms. When mixing, a tsp honey, herbs or garlic can be added to dough. Turn the dough out on to a lightly floured surface knead gently for 5 min.

Roll out the dough on to stone, cover & allow to rest for 10 min at room temp.

Preheat oven to 200C. Bake for 5-7 min, remove from oven, add topping, drizzle with remaining oil bake until golden.

For topping, I sometimes have a very ripe tomato which I just rub over spreading the pulp evenly with a good olive oil a cut clove of garlic rubbed on at the same time, then some shredded cheese.
