Message from the Workshop Manager - Roger Holgate

As you should all have noticed, with thanks to the generous donation from the Yass Soldiers Club, our new 15 inch Spiral Head Thicknesser and Oscillating Spindle Sander are now installed and operating. Also the Pyrography machine with which Wayne is having fun and producing some outstanding examples.

Thank you to those of you who took the time and interest to attend one of the introduction sessions last week during which we had a look at three other workshop issues of concern as well as a reminder on personal safety.

The issues of concern were:-

- 1. The cutting of incorrect materials on the metal workshop band saw resulting in the ruination of the blade. (Repeat ruination, not just worn out)
- 2. The correct procedure for replacing and removing the bits in the Triton Router.
- 3. A couple of pointers resulting from my observations and experiences on the bandsaws.

These issues should be a reminder that under our rules (and those of most sheds) that you should not be using equipment on which you have not been accredited without supervision. If you are in any doubt at all in what you are doing please ask, there should be one of us there who can assist you. Don't be afraid or embarrassed as we all come from different background and life experiences.

On the lighter side, workshop activities have been quite active with very few problems. There has been a scattering of outside requests resulting in some quite good income but sadly we do lack input of quality saleable items for the markets and craft sales which are quite buoyant, especially now leading up to Christmas.

Very unfortunately, two of our valued workshop enthusiasts have not been enjoying the best of health over the past month or two, Clarrie and Trevor, we all wish for a speedy recovery for you both, we all miss you at the shed.

As announced in the Monday Morning missive we will be setting up a stall in the Memorial Hall on Saturday 2nd (tomorrow). Morrissey's Messenger Munchies

Ginger chicken/turkey and pineapple salad.

- 1 Pineapple (try to get one with the leaves on it looks better)
- I large cooked chicken (or about 750g cooked turkey)
- Small knob of ginger, grated
- I small onion, sliced
- 1 red capsicum, sliced
- 1/4 cup grapes
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- · Herbed French dressing

Slice the pineapple in half lengthwise and carefully remove the flesh, cutting it into large cubes. Bone the chicken (turkey) and cut the flesh into bite size pieces.



Combine the ginger with the onion, capsicum, grapes and parsley and finely stir in the chicken. Spoon back int the pineapple shells, sprinkle with the dressing and serve well chilled"

R2 Cookbooks....



12 August

Possible YVMS/Landcare Bush Food Garden

Last Tuesday morning, we had a visit from Aaron Chatfield who is an expert on bush tucker and local plants that do well and the uses for them.

Aaron, apart from bringing some very interesting plants from which he had made a bush tea and others to taste, spent a generous amount of time talking to members about our plans for a bush tucker garden and has promised to become involved in advising on plants we can use. He also will ask Greening Australia (for whom he works) to see how they might be able to help us.

The picture shows Aaron and Graeme Fountain in deep discussions about possibilities and plans. They include recording baseline information on the site so we can monitor and track progress over time, including plant and bird counts, evaluation of soil suitability, installation of swales to control water flow and many biological and technical things that confused the hell out of me! I will keep you informed of progress with this project which has been a long time dream of a number of Shed members. Graeme is also investigating possible funding sources, liaising closely with Landcare etc.

You will also see Aaron's business card here →. Aaron is fully qualified to provide presentations, seminars etc to any groups and schools etc who might be interested in indigenous plants, their uses and history — he also gives very interesting demonstrations and tastings! Give him a call if you think he might be able to excite your group (U3A? Rotary? Lions? Rostrum? or a school with which you might be associated?)

Possible YVMS/Landcare Bush Food Garden

This project is still gathering momentum and looking like it has legs, now.

On this coming Tuesday morning (tomorrow) we are expecting another visit from Aaron Chatfield, Ngunnawal Man, proprietor of Dreamtime Connections and an adviser to Greening Australia on indigenous plants, during which he will update us on his ideas fo the garden and news about his conversations with Greening Australia on the project.

Also in the last week other progress has also been made:

- Paul Scorgie from Scorgie Earth Moving has dropped a large load of fill so we can start building "swales" to control and perhaps harvest some water (should it ever rain again); and
- Peter Davidson and Graeme Fountain have spent some serious time measuring the space with s view to
 drawing s plan that might be a start for the project in earnest. Perhaps the first activity might be a bit of a
 working bee to spread the load of fill to see if it is enough for the proposed swales, if not, then we might Paul
 Scorgie to drop by again with another load.

With this outstanding support from Dreamtime Connections and Scorgie Earth Moving a couple of signs will appear very soon on out "Thank You Board" recognising the support that they are providing to our Shed.

Stand by for more news as we really get going.


26 August

Proposed YVMS/Landcare Bush Food Garden

This project is still gathering momentum and looking like it has legs, now.

On this coming Tuesday morning (27/8) we are hoping to meet on site to finalise some early plans to develop the area including deciding on the location for building some mounds to control water run-off and to create some areas for plants that prefer wetter conditions.

Peter Davidson has prepared the **DRAFT plan** (below) based on conversations with interested people (Aaron Chatfield, Graeme Fountain, John Bishop and Landcare members). The Tuesday morning meeting will most likely also discuss that Draft Plan:



Peter Davidson, Allan McGrath, Chris Smith and I managed to deliver a minor amount of soil from the large load delivered by Paul Scorgie last week onto the lines marked "9" in the plan. This is how it looks . This effort is simply to get a better idea of how the mounds will look if we decide to go ahead in these locations. The meeting tomorrow morning on site will finalise the position of those mounds, and, perhaps, to start planning for deciding on and obtaining planting materials for the various planting areas?

She arrived at the Shed at about 10.45am and stayed for a full hour. Believe me, for a busy Member of Parliament, this is a generous amount of time for such a visit.


We had a very good turnout (I counted 24 members) and Wendy was very interested in all our activities. She showed

The Soldiers Club generously donated \$4,000 to the Shed recently and the committee agreed to purchase 3 new machines to improve versatility of wood working for members.


The three machines are:

The Spindle Sander









The new thicknesser
